The benefice is in the **Archdeaconry of Cornwall** and the **Deanery of Powder** which stretches from North to South coasts with Truro at its heart. - Mission





Our Churches

The Church of SS Probus & Grace

Probus Church is situated in the heart of the village on one of the oldest religious sites in the county. It is the largest church in the benefice and the tower which rises to 120 ft is the tallest in Cornwall.

In 2015, we launched our 5 year Mission Action Plan - Changing Lives, Building Community and have been working on seven action points that were identified namely; Our Services, Pastoral Needs, Prayer, Environment, Children and Young People, Giving and Stewardship, and Home Group and Teaching. Our pattern of worship now ensures that there are either family friendly services or a Sunday Club each week whilst also maintaining more traditional worship services. We have a very successful Messy Church with between 50-70 children, along with their grown ups attending. We would now like to explore ways to build on this to deepen our relationships with the families.

One area that we would like to explore is that of our pastoral care to both the congregation and the wider community.

Historically, the incumbent is also trustee of three village based charities.





The Church of St. Ladoca

Ladock Parish Church stands impressively on a hill overlooking the village, not far from St Ladoca's 6th century holy well. Our regular congregation is mainly drawn from Ladock village.

The church was restored by rector and benefactor Canon Richard Wise in 1864. The renowned Morris and Burne-Jones windows date from this time. A new stained-glass window, designed by Oriel Hicks, was added in 2017 in memory of Geoffrey Holborow, a longstanding and supportive member of the congregation.


In 2014, a new kitchen and disabled toilet were installed, enhancing the Church's ability to involve the whole village in street parties, concerts, festivals and school events.

The churchyard is 'open' and we have recently acquired some adjacent land to extend it.

Ladock parish includes Grampound Road village. We have an ecumenical covenant with Grampound Road Methodist Church, (pictured), allowing joint worship, usually two or three times a year in both churches as well as Lent courses. We all hope that these arrangements will continue.

Our mission statement sums up all that we try to do:-

"Ladock Church is a place to welcome and embrace all who come to hear the word of God, to worship and pray, and for fellowship. This motivates and enables us to reach out to the wider community to share the love of God."









The Church of St. Hermes

St Erme Parish Church serves a rural parish made up of the villages of St Erme and Trispen and some small hamlets.

It is a medieval church, grade 2 listed and extensively rebuilt in 1820. Further restoration occurred in 1906 when the six bells were re-hung. The south transept is dedicated to St Nicholas, the patron saint of children. The churchyard is still open and is well managed with help of a grant from the local parish council.

We are working on a Welcome Pack for newcomers jointly with the Methodists, as there are 85 houses being built and the possibility of more.

We are considering opening the church daily and developing how we communicate by using a new Facebook site. The congregation is small and mainly elderly, so resources for mission and ministry are limited. One-off events are organised from time to time, including the annual Church Fête, a Strawberry Fayre and Open Day, and sometimes Lent Lunches in the Village Hall. We are planning for some new events such as a Pet Service and a Spring Event involving daffodils. All our special occasions work particularly well when they are shared with the Methodists.

The Church of St Crida

St Crida Church is tucked away, quiet and beautiful, making it perfect as a place for retreats. It is being used increasingly as a Celtic Quiet Place, attracting groups and individuals from a wider area to Quiet Days and as a place to which to retreat informally. See https://stcrida.co.uk.

There are plans to provide simple facilities such as a kitchen to encourage further use for the church for this purpose. This is alongside regular worship using the Book of Common Prayer for services. The small but faithful congregation is very keen to retain this.







The Church of St Nuns

St Nuns Church is in the middle of the village. Whilst used for traditional services, in particular regular early Eucharist for a small but faithful congregation, there is also a lively lay-led Parish Praise Service that is supported and organised by an enthusiastic congregation under the oversight of the vicar. With an informal style, a band and modern worship songs it reaches out to all ages. It is hoped that this service could be developed further from twice a month to each Sunday.

Refurbishment of St Nuns is planned to start shortly, creating a more welcoming environment for newcomers and including a small kitchen area. The money of £25,000 for the first phase of this project has already been raised. The Church lends itself to village events and is used regularly by the primary school.

There are two home groups meeting in the Parish – a Bible study group following "Pilgrim" and a Home group that has sprung from the Parish Praise service. This group has done an Alpha course and is planning a Christianity Explored course in 2018.







Pattern of Worship

This is the current pattern of services with the help of a Team Vicar, our Curate, five local Worship Leaders, a Reader and support from local retired priests. There is also help from the lay congregation.

Location and Features

Cornwall is always ready to welcome, adopt and absorb newcomers and visitors. Its benefits as a tourist destination and film location have been well documented. The Benefice lies at the heart of the county, being approximately seven miles from both our Cathedral City of Truro and St Austell.

We are never more than ten miles from the sea, to the celebrated surfing and holiday beaches on the north coast and the beautiful Roseland Peninsula and Falmouth to the south.

Agriculture, tourism and healthcare dominate the area in terms of occupation. It is often not taken into account that there are substantial pockets of social deprivation and poverty.

We have many attractive, though narrow and often muddy, country lanes. The Benefice is crossed by the A390 joining Truro to St Austell and adjacent to the A30 to the north and west. It has good rail links.

All four parishes have experienced or are experiencing new development to a greater or lesser extent including both affordable and market housing. This provides opportunities for outreach to newcomers in order to extend and strengthen our church communities.

"I moved here only four years ago and within 24 hours I had been asked to join the Bellringers and the local Am Dram Company. I can't imagine living anywhere else now; I feel so at home." Local resident

Within easy reach of the area, there are great walks, cycle tracks, attractive gardens open to the public and a wide range of water and other sports. Truro and St Austell offer a range of shopping, music, theatre, cinemas and restaurants.

The weather can be glorious or we can suffer from incessant 'mizzle'!

Benefice Amenities

Public Transport

Communications are reasonably good. There are daily bus services to Truro from our four parishes with more frequent services and other destinations from Probus and Grampound Road.

Railway stations are situated in both Truro and St Austell, linking us to the rest of the country.

There are regular National Express Coaches with links and local pick up points serving routes throughout England.

The airport at Newquay has national and international flights.

Entertainment, Sports and Clubs

Within the various parishes it is possible to find a range of sports and entertainments. Sports Clubs: junior, adult and senior football teams; cricket club; bowling clubs both short mat and grass; badminton; pilates; yoga; martial arts; cycling, fishing and sailing.

Entertainment: Women's Institutes; Old Cornwall Society; U3A; Young Farmers; concerts, film club, talks and plays; The Ladock Players; Probus Parish Players; Carnival; allotments; weekly pub quizzes; bingo; over 60s clubs; Probus Club; Probus Ladies Group; book clubs; garden clubs and toddlers' groups.

Shops and Services

Monthly produce markets; farm shop and butcher; PO services; petrol station with mini mart; community run grocery shop; mobile library; hairdressers; car sales and car repairs; garden machinery repairs; pet shop supplies; second hand/vintage furniture; builders, carpenters, electricians, plumbers, decorators and gardeners.

Health

Probus Health Centre: GP services, a surgical unit plus a variety of other clinics, covering all the parishes. Prescriptions may be supplied from the Health Centre and clinics and even picked up in local villages!

There is a Memory Café and a number of defibrillators throughout the benefice; dentists, opticians etc. in both Truro and St Austell; major hospital for Cornwall is at Treliske in Truro and has an Accident and Emergency department; periphery hospital in St Austell has a minor injuries unit.

Places to Eat and Drink

Local inns where food is available can be found in all four parishes. There is also a fish and chip shop, Indian and Chinese restaurants (which include takeaway options) and a few small locally run cafés.

Halls

Each Parish has a well used village or community hall. St Erme also has a large modern Community Centre which is often used for Diocesan training events. Grampound also has a Heritage Centre with added space for meetings.



Schools within our Benefice



Members of the benefice team regularly visit the schools.

Probus and St Erme CP Schools have forged close links with the church, although not church schools.

"We need someone who 'gets' the important relationship between church school and church; who is grounded in the real world, understanding the stresses and strains that the teaching profession, and indeed most people in employment face; someone who is approachable and could relate to the parents; someone who could relate to the children on their level and value their thoughts and ideas."

Local Head of School

We have no secondary schools in our Benefice. The majority of students living within our parishes attend Roseland Academy, rated 'outstanding' by Ofsted.

Other secondary schools include Richard Lander, rated as 'Good', Penair rated as 'Good' and Truro and Penwith College, rated as 'Outstanding'.

Independent schools include Truro School and Truro High School for Girls.

There is a school for students with learning difficulties at Pencalenick, Truro and an Autistic Centre at St Erme.

The Sanctuary

The new Rector will be housed in The Sanctuary in Probus village, a purpose built bungalow set in generous grounds with views across the valley. The name derives from a previous church on the site that offered the Right of Sanctuary.

The accommodation includes a study, with entrance from the hallway prior to entering the main house, a living room with open fire, kitchen diner with separate dining room and four bedrooms. Outside there is a double garage and parking for several cars. It is understood that the accommodation will be redecorated prior to the new Rector moving in.

The Sanctuary is tucked away down a driveway yet very close to both the church and the centre of the village.


