The parish is comprised of 4 villages: Lofthouse, Carlton, Thorpe and Robin Hood, each with its own identity. This is a former mining area but now largely relies on farming and small businesses. It is popular with commuters working in Leeds and Wakefield because of the easy access to main roads and the M62 and M1 motorways. Housing is mainly owner occupied.
		The ethnic mix is predominantly white British. There are no other faith communities represented in the parish.

The former will be funded from donations and the latter from a legacy.

Four distinct villages between Leeds and Wakefield - Lofthouse, Carlton, Robin Hood and Thorpe - make up the parish, with the church building in Lofthouse. There is a churchyard, with Garden of Remembrance for burial of cremated remains and also an offsite graveyard on Carlton Lane, which is not closed but is unsuitable for further burials. This is a former mining area but now largely relies on farming and small businesses. It is popular with commuters working in Leeds and Wakefield because of the easy access to the A61 and the M1 and M62 motorways. Housing is mainly owner-occupied.

There is a newly established pattern of worship:

- On the first & third Sundays of the month a Sung Eucharist at 09.30 with full vestments. The sacrament is reserved.
- On the fifth Sundays a Service of the Word, Lay Led.
- On the second Sunday of the month a Service of the Word, Lay Led
- On the fourth Sunday of the month an Intergenerational Service, Lay Led
- A midweek service of Said Eucharist is held every Wednesday morning at 10.00
- During term time there is a weekly Messy Tots for pre-school children and their carers.

We welcome all who are baptised to receive Holy Communion.

Christ Church is an established and strong Christian Community and lay workers play an important part in the life of the church, involved in providing support and leadership for Messy Tots, our TLC Community Café (including our Foodbank) and G2H our bereavement support group.

The church building dates from 1840 but a major re-ordering project in 1992 provided easy access to the church, the hall and WCs. This helped to facilitate the above activities and other social events such as Indoor Curling. The TLC Café and G2H bereavement café are also held in the hall and from these encounters, and the welcome received, some people have joined the congregation in regular and occasional worship.
