WHO ARE WE?

The Parish of Reculver extends from the eastern edge of Herne Bay town centre, through the residential areas of Beltinge and Hillborough to the outer reaches of the historic English Heritage site at Reculver & then inland across woods, farms and open countryside to the village of Hoath. We have several areas currently under development with much new housing being built.

We are a large parish with 3 churches run by one PCC comprising of representatives from each church.

There is a substantial 4 bed clergy house with an integral office adjacent to one of the churches which may possibly be replaced in the future by a house built to higher energy conservation standards. It is in a very desirable location in an attractive part of the town & close to amenities.



We benefit from a dedicated ministerial staff team (both Lay and Ordained). We all work closely and extremely well together to support our worship in our 3 churches and across the wider parish.

OUR MINISTRY

Our team of worship leaders has the privilege during the Interregnum of conducting Sunday worship in all three of our churches every week offering a rich diet of Eucharistic, Formal, Informal and All-Age services. Our team is five strong:

Revd Dr Lawrence Tuck is a part-time SSM (although working FT) completing his third year of curacy and will remain with Reculver parish after training. A medievalist & former University Lecturer & Librarian, Lawrence hails form Canada & worked for 12 years in Sweden before settling in Kent in 1996. Lawrence is heavily involved with many parish groups, has led an Alpha course & prayer day & makes regular home visits to our


housebound parishioners. He leads the chaplaincy team that goes into the Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital.

Rev'd Jenny Hadlow (PTO) is a retired teacher, who worked for many years at Reculver CEP school and now offers round the year ministry and is involved with, and leads three house groups

Rev'd Gillean Craig (Prebendary emeritus, St Paul's) retired to Whitstable after 40 years of parochial ministry in London and since February '25 offers Reculver 30 weeks' Sunday + two weekdays PTO ministry a year. He focuses specially on our parish school, parish governance and engaging with the Diocese.

Ann Collier and June Conabeer, both long term committed to our worship, pastoral and general ministry, are both Authorised Lay Ministers.

We celebrate all the main festivals - either individually or together - & work together to produce services that are often used across all the parish. We celebrate each of our patronal Festival Sundays in all three churches. We are also blessed to have three organists serving our churches so nearly always can enjoy live music at our services.



Our PCC actively acknowledges and works to meet the statutory requirements for safeguarding, Health and

Safety etc. It also works closely with and supports Deanery and Diocesan initiatives. We have Lay Administrators for Baptisms and Weddings to share the load.

Although the numbers of worshippers are small, this is only the tip of the iceberg of those touched by the parish's committed, faithful ministry. Messy church groups, work with our parish school and hospital, house groups, prayer meetings, Soup & Sweet and above all the 6-morning-a-week St Bart's Hub and Collecting for Ukraine - all these involve far larger numbers and demonstrate our community-based, outward-facing ministry.

The clergy share all these with motivated, committed and effective laypeople. We are proud of all they contribute, and excited by the potential for future expansions of ministry as Herne Bay and its hinterland experiences significant growth and greater popularity. Our diverse, growing, parish reflects our own commitment to diversity within and beyond our church family.

Our three churches and their immediate communities have contrasting characters, inspiring strong local loyalties – but the crucial reality is our life together as a single family, working day-by-day in mutual support and engagement. Our parish offers a warm welcome, supportive fellowship and stimulating ministerial potential to its new priest, imbued with energy and vision: we greatly look forward to working with you!

GEOGRAPHY & COMMUNITY

Herne Bay is a small town with a big heart on the north Kent coast. After decades of decline it is now enjoying significant regeneration, forming part of the increasingly popular (and fashionable!) 'North Kent Riviera'.

We have excellent road & rail links, including High Speed, to London & beyond. The Channel Tunnel and Port of Dover cross-channel ferries are on our doorstep. There are many new housing developments with an ever-increasing local population, as well as some fine Victorian and Edwardian architecture. We have excellent local shops, together with larger supermarkets, as well as some fine restaurants, cafes and bars. There are excellent sports facilities, a swimming pool, several gyms, sailing clubs, table tennis, cricket, football and of course Herne Bay is famous as the home of roller hockey. A new, large David Lloyd Club development is also well under way, that will provide indoor & outdoor swimming pools, padel, tennis, spa facilities and much more, further enhancing the desirability of the area. There is a large Edwardian concert hall venue on the seafront, a 2-screen cinema and a wonderful "Little Theatre" with very active thespian groups locally. A well-established local radio station has also operated for many years. There are so many activities on offer that there really is something for everyone! Herne Bay is a popular filming location with a variety of TV programmes and Films being shot here.

There is a small local hospital in the town and a drop-in UTC (Urgent Treatment Centre). Our GP surgeries are well supported by 3 main hospitals in Thanet, Canterbury and Ashford with 24-hour A&E sited at Thanet & Ashford and 24-hour UTC at Canterbury. There are several fine primary schools in Herne Bay itself, as well as a good range of easily accessible Secondary and Grammar schools to choose from in the surrounding area along with some sought-after independent schools.

Historic Canterbury is just 9 miles to the south of Herne Bay, with its Cathedral being a considerable draw for Christians and other faiths from around the world. Canterbury is also home to two major universities and both NHS & Private Hospitals offering many employment opportunities.

ABOUT OUR CHURCHES

ST MARY THE VIRGIN

About 1400 years ago, a Monk's Chapel was founded on the coast by St. Augustine's missionaries from Rome who wanted to establish Christian churches here in pagan England. It was on this site that the first St. Mary's was built. It was and is still well known in the area for the striking twin towers which can be seen for miles around.



In 1809, because of coastal erosion, a new church was built about a mile further inland, on a hill overlooking the Reculver marshes and the towers of the original church. Sadly, this new church was of very poor construction and lasted barely 60 years. The present Grade 2* listed building was consecrated in 1878, and although smaller, is far more sturdy, in good repair and lovingly tended. St Mary's would be described as a village church and its churchyard is home to the village War Memorial. It is compact, quite intimate and 'middle of the road' in churchmanship. The priest and choir are robed for the Holy Communion services. Leading, reading and intercessions, as well as serving and chalice duties are all shared ministries with members of the congregation and ALMs.

The Friends of St Mary's are actively working towards the possible extension of the building to provide better

disabled access, toilets and kitchen facilities.

We have also been awarded a bronze status eco award and are working to achieve silver.





ST BARTHOLOMEW

St Bartholomew's church started life in 1908 as a smart but simple, wooden structure, before the world-renowned church architect W D Caroe designed the impressive Grade 2 listed brick building we see today. The foundation stone was laid in 1913 by Randall Davidson, the Archbishop of Canterbury.

We have a display of photographs taken during this time which show the new building being built over

the original wooden church. Sadly, work was halted by the advent of the First World War and so St Bartholomew's was not finally consecrated until 30th July 1932.

Situated at just about the highest point in Herne Bay, St Bart's silver cedar spire is an impressive feature which can be seen from a considerable distance. Originally it was a high church in more ways than one and was very much Anglo Catholic in its style of worship. Today however, it is less formal with family worship, guitar and piano taking over from the organ once a month as well as formal Holy Communion.

Just inside the south porch is the Memorial Chapel. Dedicated in 1922, it was erected by the Reverend Giles and Katherine Daubney in loving memory of their two sons killed in the First World War and a third who, having survived the war, died in a flying accident in South Africa in 1926. This beautiful chapel, hand crafted by Messrs. Dart and Francis of Crediton, Devon, bears the names and places of the young men carved into the screens for all to read.

Funds for the building were raised by the local community, for the use of the community - an ethos it continues to this day, with a Community Hub, run by members of the congregation and volunteers from the community, open six mornings a week supplying teas and coffee, clothes, books, toys and a safe children's play area and a warm welcome for everyone.

HOLY CROSS

Holy Cross Church sits in the middle of the village of Hoath, a semi-rural community of about 233 households. As well as the church it includes a primary school, a popular and busy village hall, farms and a public house.



The church is a Grade 2* listed early-English building with a Victorian interior which has been tweaked over the years to sensitively provide a discreet kitchen and toilet. The building itself is in good repair for its age and indeed has recently seen some extensive work both to the chancel and externally. Recent maintenance has included replacement of heaters, repairs to external woodwork and rendering and internal repainting of the Chancel. This has been funded by a mixture of grants, donations and a legacy as well as a contribution from the Church Commissioners who have accepted Chancel liability.

Holy Cross Church is the oldest church building in the benefice and its shingled spire is a prominent landmark in the village. Built in the 13th century as a chapel of ease for the original church at Reculver, Holy Cross was restored and extended in the 19th Century, so the current interior is mainly Victorian. This includes stained glass and a small pipe organ, which is still in use. The church also contains the village War Memorial, which is incorporated in the reredos.

Robert Hunt, vicar of Reculver and Hoath in 1594 was particularly noteworthy. He celebrated the first Anglican Communion in America in 1607, having arrived in the James River as part of the Virginia Company of London.

As well as the other seasonal events shared by all three churches, Holy Cross also celebrates Rogation each May, with our traditional Rogation Walk followed by lunch.



CHURCH HALL

Our church hall, standing in the grounds of St. Bartholomew, operates independently to the church with its own committee and bank account but that committee has PCC members on it and reports back to the PCC regularly. It runs at a profit with a core of regular hirers as well as occasional hire by the NHS (for public health clinics), local government (for polling station use) and families/individuals for ad-hoc activities. As a church we use it free of charge for monthly games mornings with lunch included and for weekly "Soup & Sweet" both of which are supported by the non-churched and as such add to our missional community outreach. The hall is kept in good repair, has recently been redecorated inside and the committee are occasionally able to give a donation to the PCC to help with general funds.

RECULVER CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

We maintain strong links with our original parish school, whose large grounds adjoin St. Marys church. This is a thriving and popular 3-form entry primary school, with pupils drawn from across the parish and beyond and with high levels of attainment. The clergy and other church members are made welcome in a wide variety of ministries in the school, and with such a large pupil, family and staff community it presents rich missional and pastoral opportunities.

There is also a popular state village primary school at Hoath.

PARISH ACTIVITIES

As a parish we are responsible for running many activities. We hold Messy Church monthly at both Reculver C of E Primary School and Holy Cross church. A Parent and Toddler Group meets weekly in term time in St. Mary's Church. Also, Tears and Tissues at the start of the school year in September, is a chance for parents who are leaving their children for their first day at school to take a few minutes in a supportive, friendly way with a coffee and chat.

Each church takes a turn to hold a Prayer Breakfast; these are held each month. Three House Groups meet regularly and a strong Cursillo group reunion meets once a month.

A good variety of fundraising activities are held, including Christmas and Summer Fairs, Quiz evenings, Cream Teas, Music entertainment, Coffee mornings, etc. etc. Holy Cross hosts a monthly coffee morning with Bring and Buy and Raffle that is very well attended by many from the village as is the annual Rogation walk with a lunch after.



From the start of the war in Ukraine we have operated a Ukraine Aid Collection Point at St Bart's, collecting, sorting and sending out many van loads of aid – at the time of



writing, there have been 76 large van loads, though there are several more that will soon be ready to leave. We have been, and indeed still are well supported by the wider community - over the years, donations have come from schools, hospitals, pharmacies, dentists, clubs, churches and individuals.

With the formation of the Ukraine Collection Point, "The Hub at St. Bart's" evolved into its present form. It provides help & support for more local

needs with a clothing bank, shoes, toys, books, puzzles etc. Items are given in return for donations, but we are always on the lookout for when there is an urgent need.



The Hub also offers a safe space for anyone to come for a coffee and chat with somewhere comfortable to sit, along with a listening ear if needed.

The "Soup & Sweet" drop in, is held in the hall next to St Bart's every Friday. Homemade soup and cake (or a sandwich in warmer weather) is available to anyone, free or for a donation if able. From the Soup & Sweet project an Alpha course has been held, at least one adult baptism and two confirmations, not to mention a house group

and some very good friendships. What began as a project to help displaced people from Ukraine has developed into so much more, thanks to a group of very dedicated people.

THE FUTURE OF OUR PARISH

Attached is the Parish Financial Summary for 2024 and our Mission Action Plan, as agreed by the PCC in July 2025. We look forward to working together with our new incumbent, using this as a starting point for further discussions & improvement. Our hearts & minds are open to new ideas and initiatives.



CHALLENGES AND PRIORITIES FOR OUR NEW INCUMBENT

Some of the most important that we identify are:

Building on our current joint ministry between the three churches, while simultaneously discerning particular strategies and specialisations for each one, for example -

St. Mary's: strengthen and deepen the links between the church and 3-form entry school and parent body; welcome and engage with those moving into new housing developments.

St Bartholomew's: build on the links with the wider community already established through the daily hub, Ukraine support project, and regular church hall users.

Holy Cross: Discern and develop what today's rural ministry, with a thriving village village hall and non-church primary school, set within farmland and smallholdings, looks like today and tomorrow.

Fabric: Major refurbishment of St. Bartholomew's church is urgent - but, potentially, redevelopment of the vacant land could release capital finance for re-ordering, possibly provision for social and pastoral spaces within the building, and a new parsonage house.

Finances: Now the amalgamation of finances is settled and we have dropped from a 1.0 to a 0.2 clergy post, build sustainable income enabling full payment of our reduced Parish Share while maintaining the week-by-week ministry of our three churches.


