### FOREWORD

The Parish of Greenham sits on the southern boundary of both the town and deanery of Newbury. The deanery is comprised of some 11 benefices and teams, with a total 42 churches and staffed by dedicated teams led by 14 full-time stipendiary clergy (a 15th post is currently suspended), and 1 House-for-Duty priest alongside a host of active, licensed and authorised lay ministers, retired clergy and others with permission to officiate (PTO). The clergy meet regularly as a Chapter, and there are 2 meetings per year which include lay ministers and clergy with PTO.

The Deanery Synod meets three times a year to consider matters of concern and interest to the Deanery as a whole. Within the last 8 months new appointments have been made to the roles of Area Dean, Lay Chair, Deanery Treasurer and Deanery Secretary, and we are now beginning a review of the Deanery Mission Action Plan to ensure we can properly address the needs of the Deanery and the Diocesan Synod's call to significantly increase our engagement with children, young people, families and schools. We hope to welcome a colleague to the parish of Greenham who will be eager to work with us in this vital mission.

### LOCATION

The parish of Greenham is situated to the south of Newbury and comprises an industrial estate, Newbury Racecourse and several housing developments.

There are a number of privately owned estates and two separate housing association/part-ownership estates.

A retail park, superstore and hotel as well as Greenham Common are all easily walkable from the church, as is a primary school and a private co-educational independent day school.





The population of the parish is currently approximately 10,000. Within the parish boundaries, there are a full range of socioeconomic groups, including two of the most disadvantaged estates in West Berkshire.

The church is positioned on a hill at the upper end of New Road, which is on the edge of several housing estates. The road and footpath through the church grounds are used by many from the community to walk from Newbury to Greenham Common.

The parish forms part of the Newbury Deanery, which is within the Diocese of Oxford.

### HISTORY



Greenham recorded in the Domesday Book



An old chapel occupied a site just a few metres to the northwest of the present church







1875

- Lord of the Manor, Lloyd Baxendale, provided the catalyst for building the present church
- The foundation stone of the new church was laid on 31 July



The new church cost £3,455 and was consecrated by the Bishop of Oxford on 24 October



A porch, north aisle, baptistry and vestries for choir and vicar were added



A new vicarage was built and the church centre added



### BUILDINGS

The church, a stunning Grade 2\* listed building where conservation work has enabled the retention of its distinctive feature whilst incorporating support for contemporary worship with audio, WIFI and projection systems together with improved lighting and heating.

### BUILDINGS

The church centre, which is owned by the PCC and held in trust by the diocesan registrar, is continually being improved to both reflect church needs and act as a focus for the community. It is self-financing and is a popular hub for community hires, with many regular and one-off bookings.

The ground floor contains an entrance lounge, toilets, kitchen and a large function hall, together with storage for equipment.

The first floor was added partly by funds generated by the hall. It comprises a circulating area, prayer room, toilet, youth room, office, small kitchen, storage and a comfortable meeting room for up to 30 people. With cleaning and maintenance carried out by volunteers.

Funds generated by the centre are donated annually to help balance church books.

The vicarage is adjacent to the church and the church centre.

It comprises an entrance hall, study, toilet, kitchen, utility room, dining room and lounge with patio doors out to the garden on the ground floor, and four bedrooms, a bathroom and toilet on the first floor.

There is an adjacent garage and parking for a caravan and additional visitors' cars.

### CHILDREN AND YOUTH



**Teas, Toys & Tots** meet every Monday in the church centre. Numbers average between 12 and 20 mums, bringing babes in arms upwards.

Activities include the indoor teddy bears picnic, a Christmas party and an Easter garden. There are always a lot of craft activities and plenty of time to share together

















### CHILDREN AND YOUTH

We have a small but consistent group of children coming to **All Stars** ranging in ages from 4 to 13 years+.

We are averaging around four children a week, with some weeks seeing up to eight come and join us.

The group has enjoyed a range of topics including a series on kindness, books of the Bible and the Christmas and Easter stories.

Crafts and wordsearches prove to be popular with the children, and they enjoy creative ways to pray, read the Bible and determine how many digestives can be sandwiched together but still fit in their mouths!

There is also a **Youth Alpha**, which is being run as a preparation course for two young people who are looking to be confirmed.

### PASTORAL CARE

#### **Home communion**

We have two members of the church who have been authorised to administer communion in the homes of those who are unable to attend the services at St Mary's, when requested.

One has also been trained as a bereavement counsellor and can provide valued support in that role when needed.









### HOMEGROUPS

Our **Wednesday morning group** meets most weeks, and those who attend support each other throughout the week in practical ways.

Each week prayers are said for the needs of the group and others who have asked them to pray. Christmas, Easter and birthdays are celebrated with a social time of food, chat and laughter.

During the spring and summer season, the group did the Bible Society's Bible Course, followed by the life of Peter and studies on 1 Peter. During the autumn season, it studied the Bible Society's course on Romans.\*





Our **Tuesday evening group** is a fun, thought-provoking and prayerful time, covering a mix of topics. It has a regular 11 people attending.

During the spring season, the group studied The Prayer Course 2 – Unanswered Prayer, the book of Luke, Embrace the Middle East's lent course and regularly enjoyed great socials with rather competitive quizzes. During the autumn season, the group studied Bible Society's course on Romans.\*

\*The Romans course was also being used in morning services and for All Stars.



### OTHER GROUPS

#### **Open Vine**

The Open Vine Fellowship began in 1988 to respond to the social and pastoral needs of women of all ages. Now generally just known as the Open Vine, the group continues to meet each Thursday morning in term time. The women come together in friendship and fellowship, to share the love God has shown through Jesus Christ, and to learn from one another.

The group enjoys quizzes, games, photographic talks, craft activities or discussions on the week's talking point. Occasionally they go out for coffee or enjoy a Christmas lunch together.

#### **Sorellas**

This evening group for women meets on an irregular basis. Sorellas is Italian for "sisters" and it is an opportunity for the sisters of the church to get together for some "us time". The group meets in someone's home or the church centre, with the highlight of the year being Pancake Evening.





### OTHER GROUPS

#### Wednesday choir

The church has recently formed a choir made up of members of the congregation, with the aim of improving their singing as a group. The choir meets monthly and is supported by two members of the worship team, who also provide the music.

At the carol service, the choir shall be singing a song that was especially learnt for the occasion. It will also take part in the midnight Christmas service.

"We enjoy our Wednesday sessions, the fellowship of being together and gradually gaining confidence in our abilities. We hope to become an asset for bridal couples who want a choir at their wedding."







#### **Socials**

Socials are arranged for a Saturday evening around once a month. They include talent shows, quizzes and other events. Starting at 6.00pm they are designed to be family-friendly and provide an opportunity to meet together, often around food.



### OUR VERY OWN RAILWAY



### **GREENHAM RAILWAY**



Originally started as a church group for men, the group's skills range from carpentry, modelling, electrical, welding and general fitting. Soon the group renamed as the Greenham Railway. Members of the group have also become a key part of the church's maintenance team for the wider church grounds and buildings.





Work commenced on an SM32-scale exhibition layout, which quickly showed its potential to draw in members of the community. A live steam was introduced on an indoor layout one Christmas, which proved extremely popular with members. Outdoors the group has moved to a dual gauge line, which has allowed them to build a "ride-on" railway.

It is now a permanent layout in the church paddock and has become an asset to the church in reaching out to the community. Fun-day events have an additional attraction, with queues for free rides always stretching out!

### PARISH ACCOUNTS

The church is financially viable, but there are challenges in this area as the main General Account operates at a loss. Funds generated from hiring out the church centre help to fill the gap.

Although the church does have some investments and endowment funds, in the main, it is dependent on current income generated by a mix of regular givers, in-church collections and fundraising for specific projects. We make use of Gift Aid and the Parish Giving Scheme.

In 2024 the church paid its Parish Share in full by the required dates.
