6.	What part does the church play in community care?	The church runs the Tuesday Café. A weekly morning coffee and light lunch open to all. Generally this attracts older people and offers an opportunity for social interaction; many of the regulars live alone and, in some cases, are isolated. Thursday afternoon Drop-In session. Tea and cakes, socialising, with some crafting and technology support. Pastoral Visitors Group (7 at present) led by an accredited Lay Pastoral Minister.

The Eucharist is at the heart of worship at CTK. Clergy, 2 LLMs with PTO, and acolytes wear vestments or robes. We have an excellent and versatile mixed voice robed choir accompanied by Clavinova. The church also has a pipe organ which is usually used at one service each month. A group of instrumentalists form the church music group that plays about once a month at the All-Age Eucharist.

#### Other special/seasonal/occasional services include the following:

Annual 'In Memory' service – particularly for families who have had funerals taken by vicar or LLM. All Souls' Day Eucharist

Toy Service (early December) – in recent years toys given for distribution by Barnardo's & Salvation Army Choir Carol Service

Battyeford Primary School hold Easter, Christmas & Harvest services in church.

Christingle (4pm on Christmas Eve – 177 attended in 2024)

Midnight Mass

In Lent: Wednesday 10am Eucharist – followed by Lent Study Group and soup lunch. Tuesday evening Lent course

Palm Sunday: Palm Procession around the church grounds and down the road

Various services (including Celtic, Taizé, Evening Prayer) held Mon-Weds of Holy week

Maundy Thursday: evening Eucharist with Watch

Good Friday: Last Hour service 2-3pm

Easter Eve: Easter Vigil and renewal of Baptismal Vows

Pentecost – often an All-Age Parish Eucharist Harvest festival - produce given to food banks Feast of Christ the King kept as Patronal Festival

The Scouting and Girlguiding groups who meet in our building are invited to all age services during the year: Mothering Sunday, Harvest Festival & Toy Service.

A house group/Bible study meets twice a month in various peoples' homes.

The church building is modern and well maintained. Movable pews and other furniture (including the font) enable easy re-arrangement of seating in church to facilitate worship in various forms and styles. This also enables the worship space to be used for a wide range of other activities and events.

CtK currently holds the A Rocha Silver Award.

The church pays its full parish share quota and intends to continue to do so.
