St. John, Garrigill has a development project at design stage; St. Jude, Knaresdale has a reordering project at concept stage.**

- 10.(b) If so, please give brief details with costs and state how they are to be met: **St. Augustine's catalyst funding from a legacy; targeted grants will be applied for. Total estimated cost, design and build c.£1.7m excl.**

VAT. (Recent changes by Government on reclamation of VAT will probably cause problems.) St. John's, Garrigill has accumulated funds (1/3) for the project and a benefactor has pledged a significant sum (project £100,000). St. Jude's Knaresdale has funds resulting from an agreement to the lifting of a covenant on the Old Rectory.

IV. Church Buildings (please give details for each church)

1.(a) *What is the general state of repair of the churches:*

St. Augustine, Alston – immediate work required to replace some slates on the nave roof, damaged in a storm. Longer term work identified in the Architect's last inspection is to be incorporated into the Rekindling Project.

St. John, Garrigill – generally good following roof repairs some years ago. The porch leaks badly, but its repair will be addressed in the reordering project.

Holy Paraclete, Kirkhaugh – Significant repairs to chimney stacks, internal rendering, belfry, outhouse roof carried out over the last 4 years. Building is generally in good order.

Knaresdale St. Jude (latest QI report) – well maintained and reasonable condition externally - no major structural defects, however, the roof has deteriorated. Internally, damp penetration in several areas causing deterioration in wall finishes. Windows need attention to improve ventilation; the heating system has failed and unrepairable. The disused hearse house is in very poor condition.

St. Mary & St. Patrick, Lambley – the church is in a reasonable state of repair, except for an unexplained leak in the roof above the east window, but it suffers from lack of use, as does the pipe organ.

St. John, Nenthead – the latest QI report flagged a series of urgent/important issues, predominantly undermining the church fabric and giving rise to damp, particularly around the Vestry.

(b) *Please give details of any major maintenance needed following the last Quinquennial Inspection:*

St. Augustine, Alston – This is quite extensive (roofing and waterproofing being prominent problems) and is all to be covered under the St. Augustine's Rekindling Project.

St. John, Garrigill – Main problem is the leaking porch; some pointing is required elsewhere, the flagged path is uneven (trip hazard), the vestry walls are in a poor state (internally) and vegetation needs removing from the wall footings. Much of the structural repairs will be included in the Development Project.

Holy Paraclete, Kirkhaugh – Repairs required to some rainwater goods and vegetation to be removed from trench round the church and then re-filling trench with gravel. Recommendation to re-bed ridge tiles.

St. Jude, Knaresdale – Priority being given to the condition of the roof and replacement heating system.

St. Mary & St. Patrick, Lambley – Urgent items include sorting out a damp issue at the East end, which will require scaffolding; and removing the redundant oil tank and contents. There is no heating.

St. John, Nenthead – roof and weather table repairs required; replacement of internal renders to help alleviate damp; window and hopper repair and restoration required.

2. *Please give details of church halls and any other ancillary buildings (and an indication of the level of their use). There are no Church Halls in the parish, though we do sometimes make use of Village Halls at Garrigill, Knarsdale and Lambley, also the Masonic Hall and The Chat Room in Alston.*

3. *Is there a churchyard to maintain and who is responsible for its maintenance? The Churchyard at St. Augustine's, Alston is closed and maintained by Westmorland & Furness Council. Kirkhaugh and Knaresdale Churchyards are open and maintained by the respective churches. Lambley Churchyard is open and grass-cutting is done by Coanwood Parish Council. St. John, Nenthead Churchyard is maintained by a current and an older retired Churchwarden. Discussions are underway to have Garrigill Churchyard closed (there is a public cemetery in the village).*

V. Outreach and Mission

1.(a) *What are the regular mission and outreach activities of the parish:* **As part of our Mission Action Plan, over recent years, the parish has had a number of 'away-days' open to all, first at Shepherd's Dene, then at Minsteracres, and most recently, locally, a 'Vision Day' at Lovelady Shield, to listen to what God has in mind for us, and establish our priorities for the coming year or two. We agreed on three priorities: 1) to bring our church family closer together, possibly by means of a parish directory; 2) a 'fresh expression' – new, accessible way of worshipping on Fifth Sundays; 3) training/discipleship – encourage us all to identify, celebrate and use our gifts. (Interestingly, shortly afterwards, the Bishop launched a 'Year of Seeking' for the diocese to look out for what God has in mind for us – as so often, we were ahead of the game!)**

(b) *What are you doing to help people find out about Jesus:* **Nothing extra to the schools' interactions.**

(c) *What are you doing to help grow people in discipleship:* **Nothing specific.**

(d) *What are you doing to grow people in leadership:* **Nothing specific, apart from those in discernment or training.**

2.(a) *Please give details of support for the church overseas:* **Bible Society & Christian Aid**

(b) *How much is given annually:* **Variable depending on congregations.**

Alston Moor – 5th Sunday collection to a nominated charity.

Planned quarterly ecumenical services dedicated to a particular Christian charity, with the offering being sent to the charity (e.g. Christian Aid Service in May)

Kirkhaugh Holy Paraclete – annually donates to Farm Africa, Bible Society, British Legion and West Northumberland Food Bank (Harvest Produce).

Knaresdale St. Jude – annually supports local, national and international charities.

6. *What part does the church play in community care:* **Pastoral Visiting Team; there is a possibility of pursuing Anna Chaplaincy and possibly building a relationship with the local doctors' surgeries. Also 'Alston Essentials', set up during Covid to make deliveries to those who were 'vulnerable', this remains mainly for the delivery of prescriptions from the local pharmacy and surgery. The church is represented on the Alston Moor Emergency Response Group and the newly formed Alston Moor & Fellside Place Action Group. It says a great deal for our standing in the community that we are welcomed without question as partners in these groups.**

2. *What informal ecumenical contacts are there?* **The ecumenical Fraternal Group (a gathering of both clergy and lay leaders from the Anglican, Roman Catholic and Methodist churches) meets regularly. One of the things which makes church life on Alston Moor so special is the strength of our relationships with the other churches: we have several people worshipping in more than one congregation, musicians playing for multiple congregations, and warm relationships among laity and clergy alike.; and we have shared a number of events – the Lent and Advent groups and Christian Aid lunch; the Covenant Service and Harvest Festival; the Good Friday Prayers at the Cross and Last Hour at St. Wulstan’s; services for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and the World Day of Prayer; the Remembrance Sunday and All Souls services. Ecumenically also, the Thursday Holy Communion at the Chat Room has become an important part of the week. The new monthly service at Grisedale Croft is greatly appreciated, and has opened a door for us to offer more care to the residents and staff – something to build on. The award-winning ‘Faith in the Moor’ is an ecumenical magazine for the Parish of Alston Moor, including news from the various church congregations and the wider community, a “Clergy Letter” by a minister of one of the participating churches, as well as articles of general interest related to that month’s theme. Started by the wife of the then Vicar in 2018, Faith in the Moor is run by an editorial group made up of members from the Anglican, Methodist and Roman Catholic churches. The magazine appears monthly, with a different theme each month, and is now on its 95th issue.**

We have begun to strengthen our engagement with the (non C of E) schools of the Alston Moor Federation, and the Principal seems keen to develop this. We have hosted services for the schools, in Alston and Nenthead, at key moments during the year, and love receiving works of art from Nenthead School at the high points of the Christian year. Leading assemblies in the schools has become more sporadic, but exploration began into the possibility of offering regular pastoral care to students and staff. A recent example was to give children an understanding of regular church ‘rituals’ (e.g. Ashing).

Our previous vicar, in his annual report for 2024, wrote, "We have a wonderful team of worship leaders – Bar, Andy, Richard, Richard and Lizzie, as well as Churchwardens Richard, Madeleine and James; and our retired clergy friends Stephen and Philip – unlike most of my clergy colleagues, I enjoy the privilege of an occasional Sunday sitting in the pews! And I love that in practically any service in the parish, multiple members of the congregation are actively involved, whether in welcoming, reading, leading prayers or providing refreshments. We own our worship! And visitors tell us how much they feel welcomed as part of our worshipping family."**

Almost all the people 'doing things' to keep the churches going are in the older age bracket and, whilst committed to what they do, are finding it increasingly difficult to cope. Finding new volunteers to shadow those with experience, is a challenge, so smooth handovers don't happen. (This is clear in this document, where there are 'gaps' denoted by ??, and sometimes where 'best guesses' have been made.)

A strong leader, with good organizational and administrative skills but with the ability to delegate as necessary, and who must have, or can develop, a strong personal support network.

Has a strong but friendly personality, be approachable and empathetic to the constraints of a rural community, and through involvement gets to know the wider community, putting the people before the institution.

Has a liking for country living and is sympathetic towards the challenges of rural life.

The churches and communities that make up Alston Moor Parish vary greatly in terms of their own local communities, church facilities and congregations. The new incumbent therefore must be able to adapt their style and approach accordingly, and make any changes in a sensitive and gentle manner.

Has a commitment to maintain the Safeguarding standards achieved over recent years. (The Parish Safeguarding Dashboard is up to date at Level 3.)

Able to bring new ideas to involve younger people and the wider community, encouraging young couples and children to attend services and inspiring congregations to the mission of the church, while at the same time embracing all forms of worship – traditional, modern and ecumenical.

A musical talent would be a bonus, to tap into people's unexpressed ability to enhance worship
