





The Parish of Ashford Town came into being in April 2016 when Ashford's seven parishes were united into a single parish. The Town Parish now has one PCC, a core ministry team, led by the Team Rector and one set of financial accounts.

We have seven churches, two chapels of ease and one church family meeting in a community hall, with a wide variety of churchmanship and worship styles. Three churches have been reordered, with two sharing their flexible spaces for community activities, and there are three other church development projects in the pipeline. We have four church halls.


An introduction from Bishop Rose:

Who we are:

Founded in 597 by St Augustine, Canterbury Diocese is the oldest diocese in England and has a special place in the life of the national and worldwide Church. With its iconic Cathedral it forms a focal point for the life of the whole Anglican Communion, offering a spiritual home and place of pilgrimage for people from every nation and walk of life.

Kent is renowned as the 'Garden of England' and this rural heart is core to our identity - yet the communities we serve are very diverse. Our Diocese stretches from Maidstone to Thanet, from the Isle of Sheppey to the Romney Marsh. We have 350 miles of coastline with historic ports and seaside resorts, alongside rural communities, market towns and commuter-belt urban developments. Affluent areas often sit alongside pockets of major deprivation, offering an exciting and challenging mission context.

At the heart of all we do is a vision of transformation for ourselves and our communities: no one can encounter God and remain unchanged. In our diocese, we want to increasingly become a Christian community transformed through our encounter with Christ, overflowing to transform and bless the families, homes and communities we serve in Kent: Changed Lives \rightarrow Changing Lives. At the beginning of our journey we divided the parish into five 'local areas' (with soft boundaries) each of which has a leadership team and at least one local warden. The local leadership teams have responsibility for mission and ministry in their community, however, they serve the united parish and its combined resources have enabled us to instigate exciting mission initiatives across our town. These include Ignite: two informal communities and church for the marginalised, MakeLunch: free food for children and parents in school holidays, Ashford Debt Centre: providing debt help in partnership with Christians Against Poverty, and Education: extensive work in Ashford's schools and college.

We are also actively involved in cross-denominational initiatives including <u>The Winter Night Shelter</u>, and <u>Street Pastors</u>.

We have an excellent partnership with Ashford Council, which sees the community benefits that the Parish brings. The Council has provided direct funding and has enabled Developer funding for several of our projects.

We are mission-minded and keen to re-imagine ministry and enable our people to extend God's work in Ashford Town.

St Mary the Virgin, Ashford



- Bringing Mission and Ministry to the people of Ashford
- Town Centre, Grade1 Church, re-ordered in 2011 as a 'Sacred and Shared Space' to serve the community
- Faith in Action: engaged locally and globally through Cafés,
 Foodbank, Theatre and Third World infrastructure projects
- Music in worship, a Choir, Band and Organ, reflect the Sunday service range; along with Thursday Eucharist, Morning Prayer, Choral Evensong & relaxed family services
- Central venue, St Mary's Art's Trust, in partnership with Ashford Borough Council & the Church, hosts lunchtime and evening music, theatre, comedy and debates, along with a wide variation of guest speakers

<u>Revelation Ashford</u> - a unique pop-up arts venue just off Ashford High Street, in the 'Shared Space - Sacred Space' of St. Mary the Virgin Church. Since 2011, Ashford's growing community has experienced high quality events, legendary performers and theatrical performances of their own heritage.

- Around fifty events each year at St Mary's, with twenty more performances on Ashford Bandstand and other town centre spaces

St Mary's, Kennington & Community Centre



- Medieval Church with adjacent modern office and hall
- Modern Church Community Centre, in Rylands Road housing estate.
- Offers both traditional and contemporary forms of Liturgy and music at both places of worship
- Maintains a good relationship with local schools, particularly Kennington Academy and Downsview Infants School
- Eagerly engages in newer forms of mission (Kennington-Style Make Lunch)
- Provides a varied range of social events

St Francis, South Ashford



- Church re-opened in 2016 after laying 'dormant' for two years
- The church and hall now host to a number of exciting programmes, working in partnership with other agencies
- Regular worshipping community on a Tuesday Lunchtime and hosts the monthly Parish Informal Worship Service
- Hosts one of the Ignite plants in Ashford
- Runs the programme 'Make Lunch' as an outreach into the local community
- A toddler group (Little Squeakers) was launched in November 2019 run by church volunteers from Singleton Church
- The hall and grounds are well used by the local community
- Hosts the Ashford Winter Night Shelter every Monday from December to March



St Mary's Church, Great Chart



- Grade 1 Listed, building with "Pest House" adjacent.
- Village location just outside the town of Ashford.
- Very close to Chilmington Green Development.
- Small but good regular attendance for weekly services.
- Very popular Marriage and Baptism venue.
- Christmas, Easter and Remembrance Services very well attended.

St Mary's, Singleton



- 25-year-old Church-Plant, serving the Singleton community
- Well attended weekly informal Sunday services
- 'Family Church' with children's Activity Mornings during school holidays
- Sunday morning worship led by congregation musicians
- Hall extension is the venue Grapevine Community Café
- Excellent links with the 3 local primary schools, one Community School, one Church of England/Methodist School and one 'all through' Church of England Academy

St Michael & All Angels, Kingsnorth



- An eclectic, broad church with an open evangelical leadership
- In the historic heart of the village but surrounded by new housing
- Offering a variety of worship styles including Café and Contemporary services

- Extensively re-ordered 13 years ago with flexible space for Toddler Groups, Drama Groups and a monthly lunch
- Modern extension with meeting room, offices and an open Churchyard

- Grade 1 listed Chapel of Ease
- In sound order, with an open Churchyard
- Two 8am Holy Communions each month, Songs of Praise service and a popular annual Crib Service.

- Shadoxhurst has a strong community feel and a small thriving Methodist Chapel
- Recently several small housing developments along with community endeavour, help to create a land buffer around the village which is becoming increasingly closer to the Chilmington and Kingsnorth planned housing

- Developing mission field, including Ignite project
- Currently engaged in plans for refurbishment of hall and church front to provide a community hub

St Mary's Church, Sevington (Chapel of Ease)



- Small and intimate worship space supported by a faithful few elderly folk
- Bi-Monthly ALM led services in addition to occasional festival and bespoke Worship
- Cut off from Ashford urban area by major dual carriageway
- New expansive business and housing community planned adjacent to the Chapel
- Project planning underway for Chapel re-ordering to serve this emerging community.



In the first three years the parish cleared circa £216k of historic parish share debt owed to the Diocese. Our turnover in 2019 was £534k however there was a £23k shortfall in income against expenditure which hopefully will be addressed over the next few years. Two years ago we took the difficult decision, for financial reasons, not to replace one of our stipendiary priests however the position remains open so there is the opportunity to expand the ministry team in the future.

Creating an innovative parish has been challenging and at times painful, however this has been outweighed by the positive effect of being united and, working together, being better equipped to reach out across the town. The Holy Spirit is very much at work in our parish of Ashford.

We want to give our new Team Rector the chance to explore how building on foundations needn't be more of the same, but exploring new models for a church in a changing world. There is a need to feel confident and comfortable in exercising *episcopé* and enabling ministry in others. We look forward in excited anticipation of what the new Team Rector will bring to this role within the parish.







Our new Bishop, Jamaican-born Rose Hudson-Wilkin, took up office as Bishop of Dover in November 2019, after having served for the past nine years as Chaplain to the Speaker of the House of Commons. Archbishop Justin Welby, commenting on those years of service, has said that he has "constantly been told that she has been an effective pastor in one crisis or another, especially in the last few years. Before that, she was a parish minister of great impact. She has been described as prophet, pastor and evangelist..." and "will bring great energy and a profound commitment to collegial working, an outward looking approach to the mission of the church and a profound spiritual life." Many of these expectations have been fulfilled in her first few months as *de facto* diocesan bishop of the Diocese of Canterbury

We believe that any new team rector coming in would find it a joy and a privilege to be able to work with Bishop Rose.



Ashford Deanery

Our Deanery used to comprise 19 parishes but now consists of 4: two in the benefice of Calehill with Westwell (villages north of Ashford), Ashford Town and the Parish of Stour Downs (villages south of Ashford towards Folkestone). Though the greater part is Ashford Town Parish, we strive at well-attended chapters and synods to include all parts of the Deanery, whether rural or urban in context. We are currently planning an exciting Holy Week in the Deanery with the theme, 'Living the Easter Story'.





Ashford Town

Ashford in Kent has been a settlement for thousands of years. It was known as a market town as early as the Thirteenth Century. Ashford is located centrally in Kent, and lies at the intersection of the south edge of the North Downs and the valley of the River Stour.

The original town of Ashford has now combined with smaller surrounding villages because Ashford has been marked for growth from the 1960s and, true to its vocation, its population has grown sizably from then. According to the 2011 census, Ashford's population was 74,204 and it is expected that by 2021, that population will have more than doubled.

Historically, Ashford has played an important role in the railway industry from the opening of the works in 1847 (now permanently closed) but there are plans to convert them into state of the art film studios. Today the town has excellent

leisure facilities including two cinemas, a leisure centre, a bowling alley, a new brewery, the Ashford Designer retail Outlet (3 million customers/year) and the County Square shopping centre. Revelation Ashford, 'a live event venue' in the centre of the town.

The catchphrase that "Ashford" is "Best Placed to Live" is based on its connectivity indeed, the travel time from Ashford to London via the High-Speed rail link is now 38 minutes (and runs twice hourly). Ashford is less than two hours away from Paris and one hour from Lille via Eurostar, not to mention the Eurotunnel service linking Folkestone to Calais.

The M20 and M2 connect Ashford to London and to continental Europe and beyond through the Channel Tunnel and via the Port of Dover.

Ashford offers ready access to London's two main airports - <u>Heathrow</u> (around 90 minutes) and Gatwick (just over an hour).

The Rectory

The three-year-old five bedroom 'executive home' is located in a quiet area of the new Finberry housing development (7 Augustine Drive, TN25 7GH), next to woodland and around two miles from the town centre.

The last team rector led Willesborough church (closest to Finberry) as well as leading the parish, however we understand that the new appointee may decide just to take on the wider role or may wish to anchor to a different church in the parish.







Ashford's Schools

Ashford Town has 31 Schools and 1 Higher Education College within the Parish boundary. As a Church we have good links and regular contact with most of these schools and we do this through Assemblies; Collective Worship; Curriculum RE; Support with SMSC objectives; and Governance.

In a new project, which came about as the Parish came into existence, the Parish is linked to Ashford School, the only independent school in the Parish, through the provision of a chaplain to the school. The post of *Priest to the Town Centre and School Chaplain* is jointly funded by the Parish and School; and the Priest is in school for half their time.

There are 5 Church Schools in the Parish

John Wesley Primary School- A joint Church of

England and Methodist Voluntary Aided

<u>The John Wallis Academy</u>- A Church of England sponsored 3-19 Academy (Voluntary Aided equivalent)

<u>St Mary's Ashford</u>- A Church of England Voluntary Aided Primary School

Kennington Academy- Formerly Voluntary Controlled, now part of the Aquila MAT (The Diocese of Canterbury Trust), primary school.

Kingsnorth Church of England Primary School-Formerly Voluntary Controlled, now part of the Aquila MAT (The Diocese of Canterbury Trust), primary school.

The Parish of Ashford also holds one of 4 foundation places on the governors of <u>Norton Knatchbull Secondary School</u>.

The John Wallis Academy, a 3-19 Academy, has the provision of a Chaplain, funded by the school on site full time. He is also involved in the Parish as an ALM.

We hold a yearly (just before May half term) Pray for Schools Week, during which we encourage our Parishioners to particularly pray for the Schools in the Parish, and we give a Thank You card and gift to each school for their staff.

We want to continue to build on our good links with the Schools in our Parish, the majority of the contact with the schools is through the Clergy Team, we recognise that we need to get more laity involved in this ministry.

We also meet with the students of <u>Ashford</u> <u>College</u> once a week as part of our Lay-Led Chaplaincy outreach.

In late 2019 the Methodist Church advertised for a New Housing Missioner to be based on <u>Chilmington Green</u>, and we look forward to working with them in building community and exploring what a new worshipping community may look like. We ran our first event at Christmas 2019 with the developers on the <u>Chilmington Site</u>, at this point there were only 18 homes occupied.
