# PETITION FOR EXTENDED EPISCOPAL OVERSIGHT

In March 2016, the PCC voted for the Single Resolution, affiliating to the Society and remained a Forward in Faith parish. This ensures that this parish remains committed to promoting and maintaining the apostolic succession, providing catholic teaching and practice and is placed under the episcopal oversight of the Bishop of Beverley. Under the guidance of the Society we are committed to sharing in Christ's mission within our diocese, to remaining within the Church of England and to work towards Christian Unity.

# LOCAL COMMUNITY

The Borough of Oldham nestles in the south Pennine Moors. It is an industrial town and at its height it was the most productive cotton spinning town in the world. However, the demise of the cotton industry meant that Oldham had to look elsewhere for its wealth, and the two biggest workforces belong to the hospital and Oldham Council. The Borough is made up of the surrounding smaller settlements, one of which is Royton.

Royton is situated to the North of Oldham where the dense suburbs give way to rural land. There is good road access to the rest of the North West region, and Mills Hill Station is within easy reach of the parish making the cities of Manchester and Leeds easily accessible. In addition the recent opening of the Oldham and Rochdale Metrolink line has improved Royton's connectivity to Manchester City Centre and the wider Greater Manchester conurbation; with nearby stops at Shaw, Derker and Westwood providing convenient access to the Metrolink network.



The Parish Church of St. Paul's is situated in the centre of Royton. The population ranges from young families to the senior age group, many of whom have lived in the local area all their lives. The population of Royton has increased slowly over the last ten years, but seems to be fairly static at the present time. There is a mix of social and private housing that includes all types of housing from terraced to detached properties. There is a mix of older properties along with newer housing built by private builders. There are two warden controlled purpose built accommodation for the elderly in the parish, and a number of its residents form part of the congregation. There are few ethnic or national residents although this number appears to be increasing slowly.

# SCHOOLS, INSTITUTIONS, VOLUNTARY GROUPS

St. Paul's is very proud of its links with our own voluntary aided primary school. The close links between church and school have been built up by previous Heads and incumbents. A new Head took up post on the 1<sup>st</sup> January 2017 and we are confident that the links will continue to flourish. Within the parish there are two other county primary schools, Thorp and Royton Hall. There are no links with either of these schools.

Within the parish there is a library, a Health Centre, recently built swimming baths and leisure centre, two supermarkets, a small shopping precinct, Post Office, private nursery, two public parks, the War Memorial is in one of them, a care home, local Scout Headquarters, Air Training Corps and several public houses.

The ground floor of the Parish Centre is rented out during the week to various organisations and private groups. Among these tenants are Rainbows, Brownies and Guides, Age UK provide lunches to the public on Monday lunchtime, weekly meetings are held by Henshaw's School for the Blind, Springboard which provides support for Alzheimer sufferers and their carers, Making Space which is a group for sufferers of Dementia, the Royton History Society meet monthly. The Centre is also used as a Polling Station. Also using the centre are three art classes, three slimming groups, two dancing schools, an exercise class and two Yoga groups. The first floor is rented out to a local business on a formal five year lease with bi-annual break clauses.

All P.C.C. and sub committee meetings are held in the Parish Centre and the Sunday School meet there on Sunday mornings, before joining the congregation part way through the service.

The Parish Centre is self-financing and all surplus proceeds are utilised for the upkeep and improvement of the Centre.

St. Paul's has a catholic tradition and the liturgy used is the Roman liturgy.

The Sunday morning congregation covers a cross section of young families, middle aged and elderly people. The Sunday School meets in the Parish Centre and then the children and their leaders join the congregation at the offertory.

# CHURCH-BASED ORGANISATIONS AND GROUPS

#### St. Paul's Servers

There are 14 young people listed as servers at St. Paul's at present. They are drawn from both Junior and Secondary age groups and it is intended that they become skilled in each part of the role of server, whether as Cross bearer, acolyte, book bearer or thurifer. The group is run in accordance with Diocesan and parish policies relating to young people.

#### St. Paul's Choir

A small dedicated choir led by our Director of Music and his deputies. They organise the Carol Service and Easter meditation for choir and congregation. They sing anthems and pieces on special occasions and Holy Days.

#### **Christian Giving Committee**

Meet on a regular basis to review the giving of the congregation and more regularly during a campaign.

### Cell of Our Lady of Walsingham

Meet on the 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of the month.

#### **Sunday School**

Meet weekly and undertake a range of additional activities throughout the year; including activity days, music and drama performances and trips to the Pantomime.

#### **Rose Queen**

The Rose Queen and her retinue are chosen by the Sunday School and ratified by the P.C.C. They represent St. Paul's when they visit other churches during the year and also organise some fund raising events.

# Ladies Society

Meets twice a month in the Parish Centre. They have speakers, evenings out and an annual day trip.

# Parish Centre Support Group

A sub committee of the P.C.C. The Group meets bi-monthly and are responsible for the day to day running of the Parish Centre.

The majority of the events organised by the Restoration & Development Fund in 2016 were very much with a musical influence. This was due to the fact that following long and dedicated fund raising, the fine Harrison & Harrison organ was stripped down and fully refurbished at a cost of just over £100,000. This was a massive achievement and the Re-dedication Service was held on the 9<sup>th</sup> April 2016.

# **MINISTRY**

We have one licensed Reader, Mr. Barry Barnes.

There are 19 Eucharistic Ministers at the present time (11 men and 8 women) who assist at communion. Home communion is taken to the sick and organised by one of the Deputy Church Wardens.

The two Church Wardens are supported by a Senior Honorary Warden and three Deputy Church Wardens.

The lay ministry is very active. People are committed to giving their time and skills for God's work.

The P.C.C. would consider any application from a member of the congregation if a situation arose whereby they wished to follow the path of accredited ministry.

# MISSION

The parish does not have a Mission Statement at this time. It would be the wish of the PCC to work with the new Incumbent to develop an appropriate Mission Statement following their appointment.

We consider our mission to the community when planning events through our existing organisations and, with the leadership and guidance of a new priest, we plan to develop the following areas of Mission over the coming years.

- $\oplus$  To uphold the Catholic faith
- $\Phi$  To continue and encourage spiritual growth
- To be aware of the differing needs of the congregation and treat them sensitively
- To promote and extend our children's/youth work
- $\oplus$  To continue to exercise stewardship though our existing channels
- $\oplus$  To support and encourage the development of the church choir and music
- $\oplus$  To look for areas of unmet need in the parish where we can be of service

# FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP

The stewardship at St. Paul's is led by the Christian Giving Sub Committee. They meet regularly to monitor the giving, to give presentations as reminders when needed and organise a full blown campaign at least every two years. Financial giving reports are published in the Parish Magazine.

Despite much heart searching, giving campaigns and hard work it has been a great disappointment that we have been unable to pay the Parish Share in full since 2008. However, because of a new system in place, the Diocese have recently agreed much more realistic figures for 2017, 2018 and 2019 and we are hopeful that these will be met in full.

The previous incumbent's expenses and utility bills were divided equally between ourselves and Holy Trinity, Shaw, and paid in full.

We hold a Lenten Appeal each year and a different charity is chosen by the PCC. Alongside this, we collect weekly donations for Oldham Foodbank. The donations of food we receive at the Harvest Festival are divided between the local Drop-In Centre and the local hospice.

- Willingness to work with the younger people and children of our parish and to continue the work with our school and to encourage and promote links with other schools;
- Willingness to promote the life and work of the church to the wider parish community;
- Willingness to partake fully in the life of the church from a spiritual, operational, social and fundraising sense;
- Ability to delegate and to enable others, working initially with and through our existing teams;
- Is a prayerful and spiritual person, showing in his own life the outworking of faith;
- ✤ Is able, with imagination and enthusiasm, to help us to attract new people, especially children and younger people, including further developing our important school links;
- Is a skilled and practical leader and communicator who has the confidence to listen and respond to the views and ideas of others, to delegate, and to identify and develop latent potential;
- Will be able to engage with people from all backgrounds in our community, irrespective of their faith, to build the place of the Church in the community;
- Will explore how we might interface more effectively with businesses and other organisations in our parish.;
