HMR / Mattingley House for Duty

ROLE DESCRIPTION

We seek a House for Duty Assistant Priest to take lead responsibility for nurturing the Ministry of the three rural communities of **Heckfield with Mattingley and Rotherwick** (HMR) within the Whitewater Benefice.

Within the Benefice we have three ordained clergy and two licensed lay ministers and our new priest will work closely with, and be accountable to, our Priest-in-Charge, enjoying the support of five Church Wardens and our PCC, working with our lay team and Benefice office for efficient administration.

Our new priest will share assemblies and governing body meetings at Rotherwick Church of England School with our Priest-in-Charge, take an estimated one to two services each Sunday, and ten each of baptisms, weddings and funerals over a year.

The position will be held under Common Tenure, based upon working Sunday plus two other days (or equivalent) per week in agreement with the Priest-in-Charge.

The Rectory, Vicarage Lane, Mattingley (see page 9) will be provided as the new priest's residence.

THE WHITEWATER BENEFICE



Two parishes make up The Whitewater Benefice which takes its name from the River Whitewater that wends its way through the parishes.

It links the parish church of St John's Hook with the three churches making up the northern parish of Heckfield with Mattingley and Rotherwick (HMR).

The Whitewater Valley is an area of outstanding natural beauty and sits within Hart District which has been voted the best place to live in the UK for several years. It enjoys exceptionally good links to road, rail, sea and airports as well as offering an excellent selection of schools and colleges for the local children and good standards of health for its residents. A vibrant church life exists across the Benefice which is growing and developing under the leadership of our Priest-in-Charge. The mission of the Church is promoted in an environment welcoming to all people, with close links to the village schools, businesses and community activities.

The Benefice population is a broad mix of ages and socio-economic groups with high levels of local employment and daily commuting. Further information regarding the villages, churches, local schools and colleges can be found in Appendices 3 & 4.



Our Mission

- Is to grow our churches. We have separate parish Mission Action Plans (pMAP) for Hook and HMR but we are working together to build on our recent achievements in the Benefice. The pMAP for HMR has been developed to address the particular needs of our three rural communities
- Is to encourage our ministry to children and young people, and the number involved in the whole church community. We are building on our relationships with our local schools, offering ageappropriate worship, and continuing to develop initiatives with our pre-schools and uniformed organisations.
- Is to continue our strong ministry to wedding couples, baptism families, and funeral ministry. We shall re-establish the pastoral care team in HMR, continue with fund-raising and social events, and thus strengthen our sense of belonging and contribution to our local communities. We will also continue to develop Lay Ministry and review the organisation of our parish life.
- As a result of recent stewardship initiatives we have seen significant increases in regular giving and donations to the Parish of HMR. Compared to the same period in 2015 receipts for the period January 1st to August 31st 2016 has seen an increase in giving of 14%.

Jennifer Martin has served in Hook since 2003 as an LLM and is a visitors' chaplain at Winchester Cathedral and Honorary Chaplain to the RASC/RCT Association in Aldershot.

and work as an integral part of ministry.

Jonathan Bushman is LLM in the benefice with a leading role in the Junior Church at St. John's, small group ministry and preaching.

Communication

The website (www.whitewaterchurches.co.uk), weekly notices, the Hook Focus Magazine and The Whitewater Benefice Magazine promote and advertise our activities. The Benefice Magazine has a wide circulation and is a significant outreach into our community.

THE RECTORY at MATTINGLEY

The Rectory in Vicarage Lane, Mattingley was built in 1968 and is a spacious house in a rural location not far from Mattingley Church.

There is easy access to both the M3 and M4, Hook and its station via the B3349.

The ground floor has a large reception room with garden access and open fireplace, a study, good sized kitchen and utility room. Upstairs there are five bedrooms, a bathroom and separate shower room and outside there is a good sized garden with single garage.





Services

A full variety of opportunities to worship are offered across Heckfield with Mattingley and Rotherwick. Services are held in Hook every Sunday, while HMR services rotate between the three churches each week. For example we offer a weekly Communion service from the Book of Common Prayer, regular Evensong and Matins, as well as Common Worship Holy Communions, All-Age Services, Informal Services, Messy Church and Fingerprints (weekly Toddler praise).

At Christmas, Carol and Christingle Services are well attended as are the Remembrance Day Services held in Church and at the War Memorials.

Our team of musicians enhance our worship and special services throughout the year.

Discipleship and Study

The Benefice is a Training Benefice and currently supporting our Priest-in-Charge we have a retired Priest with Permission to Officiate, a part-time Curate, two LLMs and a number of parishioners who participate in services. We welcome Ordinands and LLMs for placements as part of their training.

There are now five Bible Study Groups across the Benefice and numbers are growing within them, alongside a range of programmes that support and develop faith within the Benefice for both adults and youth including Children's Activity Groups. In January 2017 we shall see five teenagers and nine adults complete Emmaus Courses and be confirmed.

Schools' Ministry

Marion de Quidt takes a weekly assembly at Whitewater School, Rotherwick and we have two Open the Book Teams who work within Whitewater School and Hook Infants. The Infant and Junior Schools of Hook come into church for festivals, in year groups to learn about the Christian faith, and Marion has begun leading assemblies for the Junior School. At Easter we introduced a 'Walk through Easter' experience for Whitewater School in Rotherwick Church, which teaches the Easter Story at interactive 'stations' and makes it real for children and adults. It was very well received.

Social Events

There are a number of social events which take place annually or occasionally to bring people closer as a Church family to live out the mission of Jesus.

Events across the two parishes have included Summer and Christmas Fairs, a Ladies Pamper Evening, Quiz Nights, Bowling with Supper, Burns' Night, Harvest Supper, Talks with Supper, Bridge Lunches, Talent Shows, Charity Lunches and Lunch Club, Passover and Seder, BBQs for various celebrations, Sunday School Fun-day and Picnic, Bishop's Garden Party, Lent Lunches, Spring Plant and Cake Sales, St John's Church 75th Anniversary Celebrations, and joint events with the Life Church at Hook.

A monthly Lunch Club and daily Coffee Shop operating from The Narthex at St. John's, Hook, offer outreach and friendship for local people and visitors. At Christmas time two events with 'Carols in the Barn' draw large crowds to begin their Christmas celebrations.



HECKFIELD

The Village of Heckfield is a small rural village consisting of a few houses sited around the church and either side of the B3349.

There are two farm shops, each with tea rooms, and the village adjoins the Duke of Wellington's Estate at Stratfield Saye. In 2011 the population was 339.

The Church in Heckfield was once the centre of the medieval village, sited beside the manor house (now Highfield Park; a

conference and wedding venue) with another large house (Heckfield Place) nearby. Nowadays The Heckfield Memorial Hall serves as a centre for village activities. It has a small kitchen for refreshments after services.

William Butterfield designed **Heckfield Memorial Hall** (1863), which was originally part of a group of alms-houses donated by Viscountess Eversley. It serves as a centre for village activities, church functions and a monthly furniture auction as well as being available for general hire and in 1999 a smaller function room (The Millennium Hall) was added.



MATTINGLEY

The Villages of Mattingley together with Hound Green are small settlements along the B3349. The population in 2011 was 583. The land is mainly used for farming with cottages and houses around Mattingley Church and either side of the B3349.

Hazeley Heath to the east of Mattingley is a site of Special Scientific Interest and Mattingley church was built using locally fired hexagonal bricks.

Mattingley Church is a unique Grade 1 Listed Building. It was originally a moot hall and a Chapel of Ease to St. Michael's, Heckfield. **The modern Rectory** was built in 1968 and is situated in Vicarage Lane, off the B3349. See Appendix 5.

There is a small **Village Hall** situated in the common near to the Church. It is owned by the Church and hired by a local play group, The Pumpkin Patch.



ROTHERWICK

The Village of Rotherwick is the third small rural village of the parish and lies two miles to the west of the B3349. In 2011 the population was 564.

The village Church, Church of England primary school (Whitewater School) and village hall are all situated along The Street as are many of the houses and cottages. Tylney Hall, located just outside the village, is a country house hotel catering

for weddings and conferences and the Gordon Brown Centre nearby offers outward bound and educational activities for children. The two pubs in the village host popular social events, receptions and fundraising activities for charity.

The Church dates from the 13th century and the bells are regularly rung by our active bell-ringing team. A kitchen area was added recently enabling refreshments to be served after services and school activities in church. **The Village Hall** is a memorial to Charles de Forrest and was recently refurbished. It hosts many village clubs, parties, dances, wedding receptions and church social functions.



HOOK

The Village of Hook lies to the south of HMR on the A30 next to junction 5 on the M3 and enjoys a main line station to London Waterloo (1 hour) and bus links to Basingstoke and surrounding towns and villages. There is a large business park, small industrial estates and a number of people commute. The town is growing with new housing and future development planned. The local infant and junior schools are thriving, happy, growing establishments (Appendix 4). The population in 2011 was 7,700.

The Church of St John the Evangelist, situated in the centre of Hook, was consecrated in 1938 and designed by Sir Edward Maufe, the architect of Guildford Cathedral. The "Narthex" was added in 1992 providing a Lady

Chapel (open daily for private prayer and mid-week services), **Benefice Office**, coffee shop and meeting rooms. **The Church Hall** next to the Church hosts church activities, village groups and societies and is home to the outstanding St John's Pre-School during term time. **The Rectory** was built in 1983 beside the Church and is home to the Priest-in-Charge.

Hook has two Village Halls. The Elizabeth Hall has one large hall with a stage and three smaller halls and Hook Community Centre has a sports hall, changing rooms, tennis courts, other sporting facilities and rooms for hire. It houses the Base Youth Centre and Hook Village Nursery.

Events, Activities, Amenities

A number of events are held in the village: The Hook Fun Run and Road Race, Firework Display and the Christmas Cracker make up some of the popular annual events in which people participate, volunteer and support in all ways.

Hook residents enjoy a wide range of **clubs and activities** including: the Hook Players, Choral Society, Local History Group, Gardeners' Club, Bowling Club, Townswomen's Guild, Badminton Club and Eagle Morris Men, Football Club and the Hook and Newnham Basics Cricket Club. The younger generation has the Base Youth Centre, a full range of Scout guide Groups and Hook United Youth Football Club.

There is a Doctors' Surgery, two pharmacies,

dental and veterinary practices as well as a broad selection of shops and restaurants and a medium sized supermarket plus play parks, skateboard ramps and playing fields for residents to enjoy.

HART DISTRICT

The Whitewater Benefice lies in Hart District in North East Hampshire. Hart has been voted the best place to live in the UK in several national surveys in recent years.

Schools and colleges in the area

The Benefice is fortunate to have access to excellent educational opportunities for all ages within, or close to, the Benefice.

Whitewater C of E Primary School is in Rotherwick and was rated as 'good' by Ofsted in September 2014. The church community and school enjoy a close relationship with many joint celebrations in Rotherwick Church. The Ministry Team and Church Community are key members of school life; visiting and participating in 'Open the Book', teaching and learning with the children.

The School intake is for 4 to 11 year olds and the 2015 SIAS Report stated: "The distinctiveness and effectiveness of Whitewater as a Church of England school are good...with acts of worship making a valuable contribution to the development of the children's wellbeing and appreciation of faith and belief."

The School celebrated its 300th Anniversary in 2012 and a commemorative stained glass window provided for by the late Ninian Swan was installed in the church.

Hook Infant School and Junior School are in the centre of Hook. The mission statement of the Infant School is to work together as a community to provide a happy, secure and stimulating environment where children are motivated to learn, are valued as individuals and encouraged to achieve their full potential.

The Infant School has pupils aged 5 to 7 and the March 2014 Ofsted Inspection rated the School as 'outstanding'.

The Junior School is a County Junior School for ages 7 to 11 and the January 2013 Ofsted Inspection rated the school as 'good'.

Robert May's School, in Odiham, is the nearest secondary school and is the catchment school for both parishes. With 1,200 pupils aged 11 to 16 the October 2012 Ofsted Inspection rated the School as 'good'.

Other Schools and Colleges

There are excellent Sixth Form Colleges at Basingstoke, Alton and Farnborough along with Colleges of Further Education and universities at Reading, Winchester and Guildford.

Additionally there are a number of nurseries and private preparatory and senior school in the area for all educational ages.
